We have chosen for an Open Space to allow ideas to come up and flourish. Expect therefore a wide and open format for the day, expect to set your own agenda, to engage in the questions and issues YOU find most important and to connect with others engaged in the field. And for this to happen we recommend: prepare yourself.

Everyone participating will receive a report with the results from this day, a copy of the chapter, and a copy of the research agenda. Open access to the results of the Open Space is aimed for but we also acknowledge that there may be a time lapse needed between raising an idea and making it public. This of course can be shared with us during or after the meeting.

At the end of the day a wrap-up will be shared with a larger group of invitees from within the three universities that constitute the Centre for Frugal Innovation in Africa and there will be drinks for everyone.

We look forward to welcome you at this challenging occasion.




BREAKOUT GROUPS

PRACTICAL INFORMATION

Travel (public transport)

A direct train is leaving from Schiphol Airport to Leiden Central Station every 15 minutes, from platform 5 or 6. The trip costs about €6,80 (or €5,80 if you are in possession of an OV card) and takes about 20 minutes. In Leiden you can take a taxi or a bus to your hotel. A taxi costs about €15,00 and takes about 10 minutes.

At Leiden trainstation you can also take bus 43 which brings you to the Lorentz Center (bus stop: Universiteitsterrein) and to hotel Van der Valk (bus stop: Haagse Schouw). The bus leaves every half hour. Please find the schedule attached to this e-mail. The costs are €4,00, and takes about 7 minutes. From the train station you can walk to the Lorentz Center (25 minutes).


LDE CENTRE FOR FRUGAL INNOVATION IN AFRICA
